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### Inaugural Gilbert Stuart Portraiture Prize

April 27—June 1, 2025

"His object was to counterfeit the soul – to throw the intelligence of expression into the face of the picture – to catch the thoughts... the disposition, and with such elegant touches, that at a glance his copy is sufficient to afford an understanding of the mind of the original."

In 1769, at only 14 years old, Gilbert Stuart produced his first professional painting. By all accounts, he had shown exceptional skill throughout his youth. According to one story, he learned how to depict human faces from an enslaved African man called Neptune Thurston. He had already won awards for his drawing and painting skills at school and, according to

his friend Benjamin Waterhouse, had already begun to

focus on his favorite subject matter, the human face.

Evidence of Stuart's early skill was what brought him to the attention of Dr. Hunter who commissioned the young artist to paint a picture of his spaniels. The resulting painting, *The Hunter Spaniels*, was hardly the height of Stuart's artistic career, but it was nonetheless a vital marker, beginning Stuart's professional career and leading to the start of his formal training with Cosmo Alexander.

Since its founding in 1931, the primary mission of The Gilbert Stuart Birthplace and Museum has been "the perpetuation of the memory of Gilbert Stuart, famous American portrait painter". As we are approaching the 250th anniversary of the founding of America, and then the 100th anniversary of the museum's founding, we are looking for new and innovative ways to continue promoting Stuart's legacy. Thus, this year we are

launching the Gilbert Stuart Portraiture Prize.

In the competition's inaugural year, we have limited the competition to students at North Kingstown High School. The overwhelmingly positive response we have received thus far is deeply encouraging. In honor of Stuart's own early recognition, next year we will be opening the competition to high school aged students throughout the state of Rhode Island.

For the completion of *The Hunter Spaniels*, Dr. Hunter paid the young artist with professional materials and supplies. In recognition, Blick Art Materials has generously contributed a \$100 voucher to support our grand prize. Likewise, generous sponsorship through the United Way's 401Gives Day has enabled us to offer generous cash prizes in recognition of our grand prize and honorable mention works.

In addition to prizes, the best of the works entered will be hung in the Gilbert Stuart Museum's Bell Gallery. We are promoting the legacy of Gilbert Stuart by recognizing artists of exceptional skill who, like Stuart before them, possessed the innate dedication to capturing the world around them with pencil, paint and paper. Hanging these young artists' work alongside Stuart's own paintings, we look to find and celebrate a new generation of genius.


Admission to the Birthplace grounds is free for this event. Come and enjoy the Birthplace's beautiful, idyllic scenery while you dance the evening away.

### Student Projects: Improving Accessibility at the Gilbert Stuart Birthplace

Artists aren't the only young people whose work will be taking center stage at the Gilbert Stuart Birthplace in the 2025 season. Two high school seniors have undertaken major projects with the museum that will help visitors for decades to come.

Stephen Larson, a senior at East Greenwich High School, has opted to do his senior project at the museum, adding an audio component to self-guided tours of the museum's historic buildings. Taking advantage of QR codes placed around the Hammond Gristmill and Stuart Birthplace, visitors to the museum enjoying the self-guided tour option will be able to use their mobile phones to access additional audio material.

Adding an audio component to the self-guided tour will allow visitors with a wider array of learning styles to discover all that the Birthplace has to offer. Likewise, visitors with mobility difficulties who find themselves unable to visit all parts of the birthplace, can take advantage of the audio material to enjoy more of the history of the site at their own pace.

Best of all, the flexibility of a QR code based audio tour leaves open the possibility of adding additional material or even other languages.

You may recognize Abby Rogers as a tour guide or from the museum's front desk. A senior at Chariho High School and Senior Girl Scout, she has been working with the museum on her Gold Award.

Inspired by some of the most frequent questions asked of her by visitors, Abby's project involved developing and installing a robust system of external signage to help visitors navigate the property. Working as an analog to the internal signage that made self-guided tours possible in the wake of the pandemic, the new signs will help visitors to navigate the property on self-guided tours. The signs both identify and provide background and contextual information about the historic buildings, water wheels, eel ramp & fish ladder, and the historic dooryard garden.

In addition to the passion and drive of these young students, the funding for Abby's signage project was provided by a generous grant from the family of Robert and Patricial Fuller. The Fuller family's gift, along with the passion and dedication of Stephen and Abby, will ensure that the Gilbert Stuart Birthplace and Museum is accessible to all of its visitors long into the future.
